## Readings For The 3rd Sunday In Ordinary Time

### First Reading: Isaiah 8:23-9:3

Isaiah speaks of a people who "walked in Darkness." This is a spiritual darkness, the yoke, pole and rod are all implements associated with beasts of burden. The people Isaiah speaks about have been driven by oppression, like oxen before the plow. The light of God brings freedom, justice and joy into their darkness.

### Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17

Paul's letter is full of challenges for this young Christian community. In powerful language he makes the point that it is not the minister of Baptism who matters, but the Christ in whom all are baptized. Paul then speaks of his own mission to preach the Gospel, "not with the wisdom of human eloquence"; thus, distancing himself from the kind of arguments that had divided the Corinthian community.

### Gospel: Matthew 4:12-23

We are given Matthew's account of the beginning of Jesus' ministry—his preaching and calling of the first disciples. The arrest of John does not frighten Jesus into silence; instead, it stirs him to action.

Dear Friends,

I think all of us on the parish staff are enjoying the fact that we returned to Ordinary Time, and that a wonderful Christmas season is now behind us. That is not to say we haven't been busy.

Our Centennial year has now begun, and we're beginning to prepare for two major winter events. First, a Mardi Gras evening Mass will be celebrated in the Extraordinary Form according to the Missal of 1962 promulgated by Pope John XXIII. This Mass, which will be celebrated in Latin, will take us back to the 1960s and remind us of the experience of parishioners who attended Mass here during the first 50 years of our existence. Msgr. ### Visit Your Parish Library

More than 100 clergy attended an exorcism training weekend held in Baltimore before the bishops' annual fall meeting. It was arranged because of an increasing number of inquiries from priests in the U.S. A recent article in the London Times described the work of Father Gabriele Amorth (see below) who, as the Vatican's chief exorcist and president of honor of the Association of Exorcists, hopes that every diocese will eventually have an exorcist. Read an article on this subject online ([www.trosch.org/chu/exorcism.htm](http://www.trosch.org/chu/exorcism.htm)) and some of the library's books:

An Exorcist Tells his Story, by Gabriele Amorth (264.02 A68 E67) This 'brief and clear book allows the reader to witness the activities of the exorcist'. As Father Benedict Groeschel writes in the preface: 'Father Amorth has been very successful in helping a wide range of persons with acute disturbances quite beyond the range of clinical diagnosis. He raises the issue of the diabolical...he makes us think'.

Possessed: the True Story of an Exorcism, by Thomas B. Allen (271.4 A552 P677) The author wrote this book after a diary written by a Jesuit exorcist about Robbie Mannheim (whose case became the subject of a novel and movie) was discovered forty years after the event. The exorcism took place over several months in Missouri and Maryland.

The Screwtape Letters, by C.S. Lewis (F L22 S722) These letters, written by Screwtape, a senior devil, advising his nephew Wormwood, a junior who works on earth, on how to succeed in his mission to subvert 'the Enemy', are funny and witty.

**Chimes Chatter** — More on chimes verses bells ... we know medieval monastery foundries were experimenting with bell shapes for tone, but not until the 17th century were Europeans forging bronze into sophisticated musical “instruments” in belfries. Bronze was historically suited as bell material, being strong, durable, loud and rust resistant

when exposed to the elements. Bell bronze is an alloy of 77% copper and 23% tin. Bells were still heavy, brittle and subject to chipping and cracking, thereby becoming “out of tune.” If more than 25% tin is used, cracking will occur with age. Although vibrational patterns of open “tulip-shaped” bells are not harmonic, the lower overtones can be tuned to produce a recognizable chord. To attain proper tone, insides of bells were chipped with a hammer and chisel, consequently risking damage to the bell. More modern techniques consist of vertical lathes and electronic tuning machines to test the accuracy of tone. In lieu of bells, John Deagan radically improved sound, spatial efficiency and economy of carillons for churches designing massive tubular bronze chimes (like ours) controlled electrically, equipped with dampers to eliminate tone intermingling, and playable both manually from keyboard and automatically from perforated paper rolls. **MOMENTS IN OUR HISTORY**



This past Thursday, January 20, marked the 50th anniversary year of John F. Kennedy’s inauguration. A recent perusal of the parish archives turned up a photo and mention of a visit by John F. Kennedy to Blessed Sacrament two years before he was sworn in as President.

The front page of the March, 1961 edition of the “Parish News,” the “bulletin” at that time (published monthly rather than weekly) features a photo of John F. Kennedy with Monsignor Roach, the pastor of Blessed Sacrament (he was the pastor from 1951-1968). The caption under the photo read:

*“No, you didn’t miss seeing the President attending Mass at Blessed Sacrament. But unless you attended the Sanctuary Sodality meeting on February 4, 1959, you did miss seeing and hearing Senator Kennedy as he spoke to the ladies on his work in the Senate. It was on that occasion this picture was taken with Msgr. Roach. Following the luncheon, Mr. Kennedy revealed that he had been unable to have his throat blessed the day before, the feast of St. Blaise. Monsignor obliged by blessing the throat of the future President in the Rectory.”*

### Pastoral Council Meeting Minutes January 11, 2011

#### Worship Commission

The agenda included discussion of: engaging in spiritual exercises as a group, once a week, as a first step in the renewal of our spiritual growth. The group has chosen to read the first three chapters of Luke and Matthew and the first chapter of John, one chapter each week. Centennial activities including the Mass in celebration of the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite, to take place on March 8. The use of greeters to assist with handing out Mass leaflets and holding the doors for parishioners at the 5:30 p.m. Sunday Mass. A small group of Scout Troup 90 volunteers will be assisting with this and other volunteers are needed, especially teens and youth. Catechesis for the new Roman Missal, which is to be used beginning Advent 2011. The commission is working to obtain up-to-date information to include (at least monthly) in the parish bulletin, so that parishioners may begin to develop a fuller understanding of the transition. The Worship Commission will host Outreach Sunday in April. A specific date is yet to be set. Volunteers from all Worship Commission Ministries are invited to help plan and participate in this event, which is held to promote the ministries as well as to attract new volunteers.

The Community Life Commission discussed how to revitalize the Welcome Committee to provide new parishioners with more information on how to become more involved. In conjunction with the Centennial, the commission discussed how to utilize Coffee and Doughnuts Sunday to support other Centennial goals, including the collection of canned goods and providing a forum for other commissions to highlight their upcoming events and ongoing programs. The commission will be providing refreshments following the March 8th Mass.

The Outreach Commission reviewed Centennial events and discussed ideas for including prayer and fellowship in future activities. Plans were put in place for the upcoming Social Concerns Day of Reflection scheduled for April 3, 2011. A speaker will present a talk on the Catholic Social Teachings and for the first time a power point presentation featuring all Blessed Sacrament Ministries will be shown.

The Administration Commission briefly noted the completion of two initiatives. Sodality will provide better instructions regarding the use of votive candles. Moreover, the Poor Boxes are now labeled to show what charity they benefit each month. The Finance Council will soon receive a final report on a feasibility study regarding a capital campaign to mark the Centennial year. Such a campaign could begin as early as March and extend for several months. Pledges to the campaign would go towards a Centennial Fund that would underwrite necessary and desirable repairs and improvements to the parish's physical plant, and to the establishment of a reserve fund for future maintenance needs. The Buildings and Grounds Committee is assembling a list of projects to be considered for funding. The commission also discussed a detailed draft report a member had prepared on the clutter in the vestibule of the church. Members were asked to submit comments. Once the report is complete, it will be submitted to Fr. John with a recommendation for action. Finally, the commission discussed the possibility of convening a special meeting to clarify its mission and its relationship to the committees with which it works.

The Faith Formation Commission discussed the Parish Council's initiative in developing lay spirituality. One option under consideration is a Parish Lay Institute, which would be a program offered to ministry leaders. Details will be shared pending further discussion and final agreement of the plan. The next Faith on Tap event, a follow-up to the "Why Catholic?" lecture, will be on Thursday, February 10. We are honored to have Cardinal McCarrick as the speaker. The commission discussed facilitating follow-up discussion groups to the Faith on Tap event.
